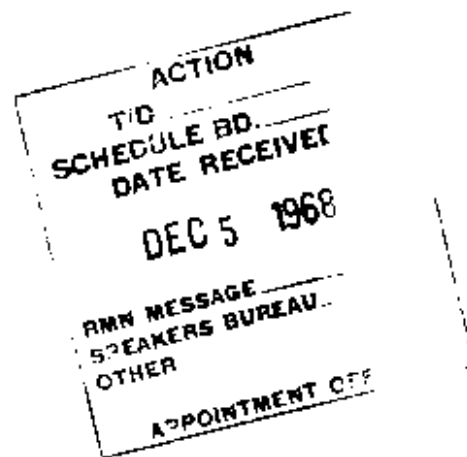



I know that in 1972 we will be ready to go again, except that then we will be even more knowledgeable in the field of political campaigning. Needless to say, we learned a lot with this one.


I'm looking forward to coming to Washington, D.C. early next year. I hope to spend maybe a week or so sightseeing. I sure hope that you will be available for a personal escort.

Stockbroker's Extra Room Houses His 'Sickness'—30,000 Autographs

One night several years ago a New York stockbroker named John I. Taeni hurried home from his office to tell his wife regretfully that he would be unable to go to the theater with her that night as planned. He had urgent business, many letters to write.

Mrs. Taeni hardly needed to ask "To whom?" She could guess. A new cabinet had been formed in Chile; her husband, perhaps the world's most assiduous collector of autographs and signed documents, must lose no time acquiring the signatures of the new cabinet.

"Tomorrow," he said, a little sadly, "it may be too late. Who knows?"

A Prisoner?

A suggestion of sadness is likely to creep into Mr. Taeni's voice whenever he speaks of the hobby he rides, or rather which now rides him.

"I am a prisoner of it," he warmly declares. "It is my happy sickness. If I had a son I'd never allow him to do as I do. But I can't give it up."

His wife and I came back from Europe the other day after being away two months. The first thing I did was to sit down and write 45 letters to new men in the news—politicians and the like.

"Would I sell the collection? Do you sell your children? My children, my illness?"

Began With Bel.

All this madness, as Mr. Taeni also likes to describe it, began in 1916 in his native Austria. One day in Vienna he made a bet with a fellow student that he could get Field Marshal von Falkenhayn's autograph. He won the bet.

Now he has 30,000 signatures which fill over 400 volumes, as well as separate documents, letters, etc. They fill a room in his home, 177 E. 75th St.

He has the autograph of every important man and woman in public life in the

world, the Russians included. But he never got Stalin's, though he wrote him many times. He secured Malenkov in London with his last letter.

Washington Warrant.

The highest price he ever paid was \$500 for a warrant, signed by President Washington and Secretary of State Jefferson, appointing the young American republic's first consul in England. He owns every President, Vice President, and hundreds of cabinet members.



Unsought Advice

One would think if the Democratic party had won the presidential election, the way the speculation and suggestions on whom President-Elect Richard Nixon should name to his cabinet have been running.

Most of the speculation appears to be emanating from the liberal wing of the Democratic party, which is sounding off on which Democrats would be acceptable and which would not. Also, the liberal Democrats are being liberal with their advice on which Republicans are sufficiently liberal to be acceptable.

The basic assumption in all this is that Nixon must form a coalition government. Sentinel columnist Joseph Alsop described what the liberals have in mind when he suggested that Nixon should "try to create a broad spectrum, center government, commanding moderate Democratic as well as moderate Republican support." Moderate, it should be noted, is a code word for liberal.

Nixon did indeed win with a minority of the total vote, narrowly edging out Vice-President Hubert Humphrey. Still, his margin of victory was bigger than that by which John F. Kennedy nipped him in 1960.

But we don't seem to recall that, when Kennedy was putting together his cabinet, the liberals were so all-fired anxious that the conservatives be represented in the Kennedy government. In fact, the conservatives have been rather completely frozen out of the administration for the last eight years.

Nixon's fundamental pledge was to provide the nation with new leadership. He would be going back on that pledge at the outset if he picks some of the old politicians and tired liberals being recommended by the election losers.
