# Public Esteem For Nixon Soars in Poll

Copyright, 1971, The Hartford Times

Public approval of President Richard M. Nixon's performance has moved sharply upward over the past five months, according to the Connecticut Poll.

The poll, conducted exclusively for The Hartford Times by Becker Research Corp. of Boston, finds that 65 per cent, fully 10 points higher than in April, have a favorable opinion of the way the President is handling his job.


Most of this higher approval rate appears to have resulted from people who previously disapproved, changing their minds—adverse reaction to Nixon's performance has declined 7 points from 32 per cent to



25 per cent since last spring, while the "no opinion" rate has changed hardly at all (10 per cent today, 13 per cent in April).

dent in August seems to be a major factor in his improved public standing in Connecticut. Some seven people in 10 who approve of this action, as compared with only about one in three who disapprove, are satisfied with Nixon's' performance:

Furthermore, the temporary wage-price freeze may very well help to explain why many people who are most unemployment nevertheless almost two to one. react positively to Nixon. While they understandably are not so favorably disposed to the President as those who are less concerned about either of these problems, six people in 10 who consider inflation a "very serious" problem and an equal percentage of those who feel that way about unemployment, approve of his performance.

Also, a majority of those who say their financial situation is worse today than it was a year ago feel Nixon is doing a good job.

In this connection, even among the poor, more than half of whom say they are worse off than a year ago and almost nine in 10 of whom are deeply concerned -about inflation and unemployment, a majority are satisfied with the President's performance.

 The President's public announcement of his plans to visit Communist China . next spring appears, to have had less impact than the wageprice freeze on his popularity. Approval of Nixon's performance is not a great deal lower among those who three-quarters of its conservatives approve of his performance.

Of real significance, however, is the fact that twothirds of both Independents and middle-of-the-roaders are pleased with what the President is doing.

As I think I have told you, Becker polls throughout New England and in 1970 was remarkably accurate in forecasting the various Senate and Gubernatorial races. In fact, he was right in every state. His Connecticut polls have been consistently better than the national average and there is, therefore, probably somewhat of a bias our way; although Becker tells me that this is not sò, that these polls in his opinion are quite accurate.

Even if he is off, however, by as much as 10 percent we certainly are in good shape in Connecticut.

# Public Esteem For Nixon Soars in Poll

Public approval of President Richard M. Nixon's performance has moved sharply upward over the past five months, according to the Connecticut Poll.

The poll, conducted exclusively for The Hartford Times by Becker Research Corp. of Boston, finds that 65 per cent, fully 10 points higher than in April, have a favorable opinion of the way the President is handling his job.

Most of this higher approval rate appears to have resulted from people who previously disapproved, changing their minds—adverse reaction to Nixon's performance has declined 7 points from 32 per cent to



25 per cent since last spring, while the "no opinion" rate has changed hardly at all (10 per cent today, 13 per cent in April).

dent in August seems to be a major factor in his improved public standing in Connecticut. Some seven people in 10 who approve of this action, as compared with only about one in three who disapprove, are satisfied with Nixon's performance.

Furthermore, the temporary wage-price freeze may very well help to explain why many people who are most worried about inflation and/or unemployment nevertheless react positively to Nixon. While they understandably are not so favorably disposed to the President as those who are less concerned about either of these problems, six people in 10 who consider inflation a "very serious" problem and an equal percentage of those who feel that way about unemployment, approve of his performance.

Also, a majority of those who say their financial situation is worse today than it was a year ago feel Nixon is doing a good job.

In this connection, even among the poor, more than

In this connection, even among the poor, more than half of whom say they are worse off than a year ago and almost nine in 10 of whom are deeply concerned about inflation and unemployment, a majority are satisfied with the President's performance.

The President's public announcement of his plans to visit Communist China next spring appears to have had less impact than the wage-price freeze on his popularity. Approval of Nixon's performance is not a great deal lower among those who are against the visit (56 per cent approve of Nixon performance) than it is among those who are in favor (68 per cent approve of Nixon performance).

Party affiliation and political outlook continue to play an important part in determining attitude toward the President. Better than 40 per cent of both Democrats and liberals react adversely, while almost 90 per cent of the state's Republicans and

three-quarters of its conservatives approve of his performance.

Of real significance, however, is the fact that two-thirds of both Independents and middle-of-the-roaders are pleased with what the President is doing.

Perhaps of equal importance, among people under age 30, a group which Nixon has been accused of alienating, approval outweighs disapproval by almost two to one.
