Dear Madam:

At the suggestion of Mr. Murray Chotiner, I am addressing this letter to the President through you. I would first like to introduce myself. My name is Victor C. Andrews. I reside at 169 Emerald Bay, Laguna Beach, California. My telephone number is (714) 459-2401. My business address is 666 East 17th Street, Santa Ana, California; business telephone is (714) 541-5105.

I was the Orange County Campaign Chairman for Mr. Nixon, and feel that the results obtained in Orange County contributed more to the success of the campaign than any other county. Our majority was in excess of 270,000 votes which is almost double that generated by any other county. Our percentage of turnout was the highest in the history of Orange County for any candidate for any office. In addition we raised more money than we ever have for any candidate for any office. I think it is safe to say that Orange County has been and will continue to be the seat of political power for the Republican Party in United States.

The purpose of this letter at this time is to bring to the attention of The President the deep concern I have for the next election year of 1972. In this regard it is my candid opinion that unless an all out effort is made in California to secure the gains made in 1968, the same support will not be available to The President in 1972. Not only must past gains be made secure but an all out effort in other areas of California be made in order to insure that the State "will go Nixon" in 1972. Governor Reagan represents a force that must be reckoned with and we should clearly understand that the Reagan people are working diligently and constantly in behalf of their man. His strength is considerable in Orange County and I would be concerned about an all out confrontation. The organization that was created in Orange County in this past election without question was the best organized, and


produced far and away the best results of any county and could be used as a nucleus to build the kind of an organization that would insure victory in 1972.

Orange County together with San Diego County produced the Nixon victory in 1968. Without this support the forty electoral California votes would have been lost and hence the State. It is my fervent hope that we could maintain and even increase the support for The President over the next three years, but this is not going to come about unless there is all out Nixon support for the pro-Nixon people.

It might be interesting for The President to know that among my other responsibilities besides conducting his campaign is being Chairman of the Board of South Coast Community Hospital and Chairman of the Board of Chapman College and a member of the Board of Directors of the Lincoln Club as well as many other lesser civic involvements.

Should The President wish to come to California for any kind of appointment it might be suggested to him that he consider Chapman College, i.e. our commencement exercises will be on June 15th and we would indeed be honored if Mr. Nixon would like to speak on this occasion or at any other future time. I am not aware of what honorary degree he may have, but please be assured that a degree would be made available to him. This could well be an opportune time for a major speech, and what better place than Orange County.

Regarding the foregoing concern, I would be happy to discuss this matter further with The President or with anyone he designates. I have discussed this matter fully with Mr. Donald Nixon, Mr. Herb Kalmbach and Mr. Murray Chotiner and they all concur this is a matter of utmost importance and should be given immediate and top priority.

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

Tom Anfinson to rmw

"I am going to be running for an office here in California in 1974.

We are working on a couple of things. I have been talking with Ivy Baker Priest. If she doesn't run I am going to run for that office. Local Republican cities are filled with young people who will be staying in office.

"We felt our best chance is running for a statewide office. Also the Assembly and Senate jobs do not pay enough - just \$19,000. The statewide jobs pay about twice that much.

"Failing that - if Ivy Baker Priest decides to run than Hugh Flournoy is not going to run for his job. He wants to run for Governor or Lt. Gov. He can afford to wait eight years if he has to.

"Couple of people have talked about running for Flournoy's office.

"Best possibility would be Ivy's seat!

"What I felt it would be necessary to do would be at sometime to talk with the President about this. To get his feelings on this -- whether it is the thing to do or not.

"I am planning on going back to the inauguration. (rmw said at that time that there would be no personal appointments at that time as there would be literally thousands of people in town -- and many of them wanting appointments with the President -- the schedule just would not permit any personal appointments with all the official events."
