Part of a conversation between President Nixon and Henry A. Kissinger in the Oval Office between 12:52 pm and 1:04 pm on April 23, 1971.

Conversation No. 487-15

Kissinger: The best asset that, that Hanoi has had is the fact that you were not even given the

minimum one year that a President should have. They started rioting in June.

They kept it up through October. The first year you had to break it. Then when it

was quiet enough, every six months they have had demonstrations.

President: Isn't that interesting? They had one, of course, Cambodia w-, the Cambodia

demonstrations would have come off whether Cambodia had --

Kissinger: Mr. President --

President: -- been invaded or not. They were already set up.

Kissinger: -- just as these would have. All the essential elements of these: the --

President: [Unintelligible].

Kissinger: -- People's Peace Treaty, the, uh, attack on the bombing, all of this was being

drowned away even without Laos. Now I admit Laos created the malaise.

President: Crap! Laos did not create, it did not really charge up the attack so much as it

discouraged our own people.

Kissinger: That=s right.

President: Let=s face it, that=s what --

Kissinger: That is right.

President: -- [unintelligible], now that, now that [unintelligible].

Kissinger: Two months later they would have, they would have got something going.

President: But as far as our own people are concerned, whether we can keep them, frankly,

bucked up until we see it through, uh, just remains to be the, the great open

question. I think maybe we can. Well, at least we will try; we're gonna try to do

it; we're gonna try to see it through; we're gonna be as tough as hell, and, uh,

[unintelligible] the best. That's all.
