Part of a telephone conversation between President Nixon in the Lincoln Sitting Room and Charles W. Colson between 10:40 pm and 10:49 pm on April 29, 1971.

Conversation No. 2-67

Colson: [Unintelligible].

President: Well, you always say that. [Laughs]

Colson: [Unintelligible].

President: I was pretty tough.

Colson: [Unintelligible].

President: They were tough, yeah.

President: Well, they were trying to get at me and I moved. But they were trying to get at me. I didn't let them do it.

President: Below the belt, but that's all right. It gave me a chance to say, "Here's the guy

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who's got a shoulder entry and, goddammit, he oughta be in the White House."
