Conversation No. 482-8#1

Haldeman: We had a very good break in Evans and Novak this morning [unintelligible].

President: [Unintelligible].

Haldeman: Their --

President: [Speaking to Manolo Sanchez] Thanks very much.

Haldeman: -- their subject is "Muskie and the Trotskyites" and they make a thesis that we can

build on and coming from them gives us something to do with it. Saying the fact

that Muskie endorsed some of these demonstration here without even considering

its domination by Trotskyite Communists typifies the cloak of respectability

inadvertently provided from the far left by liberals.

President: Inadvertantly, huh?

Haldeman: Then he, he goes to great --.

President: Goes to what?

Haldeman:

They make the point that, that, uh, these, the people th-, he dictated the history of who put this demonstration together, that it's the Young Socialist Alliance which is the, has replaced the SDS as the radical organization now, that they are unde the Socialist Workers= Party, an undeviating [unintelligible] line, that they admit they're using, only using the war as a device, and, uh, goes through the whole, whole [unintelligible] of the antiwar movement [unintelligible]. [Unintelligible] they think it is to have two world capitals. They say they want more than just peace in Vietnam. Their literature describes the Communist aggression in Vietnam as the Vietnamese revolution and heaps praise on it. And they pick 'em. They pick whosever organized this demonstration, the liberals, and the, the result is what would have been unimaginable a few years ago: hundreds of thousands of Americans marching in the Capital under Trotskyist command. This, in this town, is gonna bother some people.
