Part of a telephone conversation between President Nixon in his office in the Old Executive Office Building and John Griner at an unknown time between 1:16 pm and 3:00 pm on May 5, 1971.

Conversation No. 42-99

President: Hello.

Griner: Yes, sir.

President: Just wanted ya to know that, uh, I made, took note of the fact as you probably, uh,

watched in the papers, that, uh, the great, uh, number of, uh, great majority of Federal employees, uh, all came to work on Monday. And that's to their great credit, and I think part of the credit, and a great part of it, goes to you and your

leadership over there, and I'm most grateful for you.

Griner: Mr. President, I --

President: Yeah.

Griner: -- certainly appreciate that --

President: Yeah.

Griner: -- and I --.

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President:

Well, you tell the, tell the fellows and the, and the people working in your office that, uh, when we've got a responsible, you know, trade union, uh, leadership that, uh, that really helps, because you know that'd been so easy for them to be intimidated by this rat pack.
