

MEMORANDUM FOR CHARLES W. COLSON

SUBJECT: Illinois Politics

Dick Wiley, our new General Counsel at FCC, was recently Committeeman of one of the most Republican townships in Cook County. He gives me a rather discouraging report regarding '72 prospects in Illinois. He suggests strongly that everything possible be done to get to Rentschler and get him back on the team stopping his harassment of Ogilvie, and that we do everything possible to avert primary candidates for Ogilvie, Scott and Percy.

He feels we lost because Rentschler scarred up Smith very badly in the primary giving the Democrats more than enough ammunition, Smith ran a very negative campaign that was poorly received, and Ogilvie is in deep trouble because of the income tax. Anything that can be done to brush up Ogilvie's image from its complete low ebb at this time will be most useful.
