Report on meeting with Ambaesador Anneaberg, John Mitchell Tuesday, May 9, 1972 - 5:00 p.m.

John Mitchell, Ambassader Annenberg and John Ehrlichman entered the President's office from Steve Buil's office. Upon entering, the Ambassader cried, "There it is !" and moved immediately to an inspection of the Steuben glass star-shaped sculpture bearing the Presidential Scal mounted on green malachite which he saw on the President's dock. It was a gift from the Ambassader and his wife to the President, made from the Ambassader's design and this was his first opportunity to see it in being.

The President was obviously distracted and had his mind on other things.

Ambassador Annemberg sat in one of the chairs by the fireplace, the President in the other while John Mitchell and John Ehrlichman sat on opposite couches.

The conversation ranged across Pennsylvania, Philadelphia and California politics, the state of the conservative party in Great Britain, the Ambassador's problems in having his daughter appointed a delegate to the California State Republican Convention, etc.

While the Pred dest made appropriate replies and kept the Ambassader's conversation moving, nevertheless it was evident that the President was heavily distracted by other thoughts.

The meeting lasted about 25 minutes. John Ehrlichman and John Mitchell left in advance of the Ambassador who hung back and had a few private words with the President for a matter of a minute or two.
