## MEMORANDUM FOR

Bob Haldeman

On the political side, I would like you to follow up with Billy Graham in his work with Negro ministers across the country. He feels this is our best chance to make inroads into the Negro community. I am inclined to agree with him. The professional Negro radicals simply can't be for us any more than the white radicals can be Just as we are trying to appeal to our own constituency among the whites, we should remember that there is a similar constituency, although eminently smaller, among Negroes. Let's not overlook them in attempting to pander to the radicals - black or white.
