MEMORANDUM FOR BOB HALDEMAN

FROM ROSE MARY WOODS



Jack Porter called this morning to say "I need to see the President for a few minutes."

I explained that I had nothing to do with the President's schedule and wanted to refer him to Dwight Chapin or David Parker. He said, "No, I don't know anyone but you so will you give the President a note telling him that I need to talk with him about the political situation in Texas."

I promised that I would pass the information on to the people who have the responsibility for his schedule. He again said please give a note to the President.

After this conversation, he said "I think the President is doing a great job. It is the toughest job in the world. I think he will go down in history as one of our great Presidents."

Would you please call him - or have someone very high up call him. He can be helpful -- but if he is terribly unhappy he can cause trouble too. He was very pleasant and friendly on the telephone but I don't want to upset any applecarts at this time.
