





The National Committee recently launched its program to meet the immediate need for developing state and local speakers to support the Administration before young audiences.

We are planning a two-day Washington seminar at the Statler Hilton in December (14th and 15th) for the purpose of bringing approximately two elected officials from each state for discussions with chief Administration spokesmen. 





Signal Companies See Positive '73

The Signal Companies, Inc. see a "positive 1973" and a "very positive outlook beyond that," although they had to take a few lumps at the start of this decade.

This is the way Forrest N. Shumway, president and chief executive officer for the Signal Companies sees the future of the company he heads.

Shumway, in a talk before the Los Angeles Society of Security Analysts said that while Signal started its corporate career by drilling oil wells at old Signal Hill it has since branched out into many fields.



Mack Truck Outstanding

From the profit aspect, Shumway said that the Mack Truck Division is a stand out. They are having a tremendous year, with production at an all time high and profits will also be at an all time high, he said. Then he added, we also look for 1973 to be a boom year and, "we probably will have several fine years."

To meet demand, Mack Truck has initiated two new expansion programs. Ground was broken on a new vehicle product development and test center in Allentown, Pa. and the company has inaugurated an expansion of its engineering test and development facilities in Hagerstown, Md.

As for its Garrett Division, Shumway said that it is not involved in the aerospace business as heavily as most people think. As a matter of fact, he said, over the next decade Garrett may become the profit leader of the group. It is one of the most highly technically oriented companies in the country and it has had some important technical breakthroughs, particularly in the gas turbine field. As to the jet engine field, he said the company is making progress and while it did take a big write down in 1970, they are still very much in the jet field and expect to continue there.

Turning to the oil and gas division, the President said it is suffering from depressed prices for crude oil and gas, but this can not last. There is just not enough gas and oil and sooner or later drilling will have to be stimulated by higher prices he said. The company is getting out of the marketing business but they have a strong exploration program in a number of places around the world.

More Oil Exploration Needed

Shumway added to this during the question period by saying that instead of reducing the depletion allowance for oil exploration, Congress should increase it to 50 per cent to encourage drilling. If they don't do something, he said, it is going to be difficult to find people who will take the high risk to find oil without the thought of high return.

Looking ahead at the future, the President said that their real estate operations would become more and more important. Generally as a result of oil operations, the company has from time to time acquired substantial properties. They are now looking over these properties. Some will be sold outright while others likely will be developed by the company.

Added to the above, there is also the Signal Investment Company which owns a 48 per cent interest in American President Lines. Shumway felt that as business with the Far East developed, this investment might be extremely good. The investment company also owns a 49.9 per cent interest in Golden West Broadcasting which in turn owns four radio stations, one television station, has an interest in the California Angels Baseball team and the Los Angeles Rams football team.

Along with all this, there is also Precision Rubber Products Corp., Dunham-Bush Inc., Data Dissemination Systems, Signal Chemical Corp. and Signal Galaxies Inc.

Earnings On Uptrend

Putting this together in a financial way, Signal companies for the nine months ended September 30 had \$1.09 billion of gross business and earned \$1.41 per share of which 8 cents was extraordinary. This compares with \$986 million of sales last year in the same period and earnings of 88 cents per share, of which 10 cents was extraordinary.

Asked to estimate earnings for the year, Shumway said that at this point he really did not know, because it depended on so many things.

The Signal Companies have 19,156,000 common shares outstanding and the cash dividend paid last year was 60 cents. The shares have sold at a high this year of 27 1/8 and a low of 18. It is currently about midway between the two.
