RE: Appointments to Labor Department that Secretary Shultz has in mind.

Secretary of Labor-Designate Shultz has the following appointments in mind:

- Firm offer has been made and RN is supposed to call James Hodgson, Vice-President Lockheed Burbank, for Under-Secretary of Labor. Hodgson is a Registered Democrat who worked in Democrats for RN in '60 and '68.
- Firm offer has been made by Mr. Shultz to Arnold R. Weber for Assistant Secretary for Manpower. Weber lives at 5743 S. Blackstone Ave., Chicago and is currently at the University of Chicago.
- 3. Tentative Jerome Rosow, currently Director Employment Relations ESSO Europe. Home address: 17 Davies St. London West One, England for Assistant Secretary of Planning and Development, a post that does not now exist in Labor but that Mr. Shultz intends to implement for long range planning.
- 4. Tentative Jeffrey Moore who can be reached at the National Bureau of Economic Research in New York City for Commissioner of Labor Statistics.
- 5. Tentative Elizabeth Kootz, currently President National Education Association in Washington, D.C. for Director of the Women's Bureau of the Department of Labor.
- Tentative Assistant Secretary for International Affairs, George Weaver. He is currently the Assistant Secretary for International Affairs and Mr. Shultz would like to keep him
