Tuesday, February 15th. The main discussion today was some review of trip plans. The President particularly getting into the question of arrival home after China, being that he definitely does not want to arrive in Washington at noon, but rather at 9:00 at night to make prime time television. So we had some discussion of how to accomplish that, either by staying an extra nine hours in Shanghai, or by stopping in Anchorage and going to bed for nine hours, so as to delay the arrival. We finally decided on the latter, after going back and forth in discussion with Ziegler, Chapin, and then, finally Kissinger, who said we just couldn't change the, the schedule in Shanghai. We also got into plans for the Soviet trip, and...

...are definitely now going to stop in Iran on the way back and use that as the excuse for not going to NATO.

The President went on up to Camp David this afternoon and will spend the night there and do some work up there tomorrow. He called me from there this after--, late this afternoon, concerned with some flap Kissinger raised with him about a letter to a Jewish group signed by the President about our attitude toward Soviet Jewry.
