MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: STEPHEN B. BULL *AK*

SUBJECT: California Ballot

The 1972 California ballot contains twenty-two propositions. Bob Finch has researched all of the propositions, and at my request, provided his recommendations for your consideration and guidance. (Sample ballot attached)

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



