



Return Address

Q. I contributed to the Loyalty Fund last April. Why am I being solicited again in the same year?

A. The Loyalty Fund, like the University's financial operations, is conducted on a fiscal calendar, that is, from July 1 to June 30. Contributions received last spring were credited to the 1969-70 Loyalty Fund campaign which ended June 30, 1970. The current 1970-71 campaign began this past July 1 and will conclude next June 30.

Q. Well, I'd like to give, but a small gift really won't help much, will it?

A. But it will indeed. A rising tide lifts all the boats. Duke gratefully welcomes gifts of all sizes, and it needs *all* kinds of gifts from one kind of alumnus or alumna—the kind who loves the University for what it is and what it does and who wants to share in its continuing service.

Q. How much should I give?

A. Enough to make you think you've done enough. Duke asks only that you put it in what you regard as its proper place in your annual charitable giving. Last year, several thousand alumni gave \$25; a few gave over \$5,000. The example of the former undoubtedly had much to do in influencing the latter.

Questions About Giving

and some answers

Q. Just how important is the Loyalty Fund to the University?

A. Vitally important. It is one of the largest segments of current-use gift money available each year, and Duke depends on the Loyalty Fund to provide the financial support it must have in order to meet current needs. During the decade of the 1960's, for example, the Loyalty Fund brought to Duke a total of \$6,484,588!

Q. That's fine, but isn't endowment income, plus tuition and fees, enough for all needs?

A. No, unfortunately it isn't. No private university in the country has enough endowment to meet today's complex needs. What's more, Duke's endowment income has been shrinking as a percentage of expenses for a good many years. In fiscal 1947-48, for example, Duke's operating budget was derived 30 percent from endowment earnings; in 1968-69, by way of contrast, only 10 per cent of the operating budget came from endowment earnings.

Tuition and fees have never constituted more than approximately one-third the cost of educating a student. That figure is even lower today in spite of recent tuition increases.

Q. Even so, Duke can meet costs, can't it?

A. This year the University has had to budget a \$1,000,000 deficit. In a period of rising costs and accelerating responsibilities, there was no other

choice if the quality of a Duke education was to be preserved. This was done, however, with confidence on the part of President Sanford and the new administration that alumni, as Duke's primary beneficiaries, would give maximum support through the Loyalty Fund.

Q. Does a school or college really benefit by a Loyalty Fund gift that is designated to it?

A. Definitely. Starting this year, Loyalty Fund contributions go directly to the individual schools and colleges to help finance their separate educational programs. Each school and college is thus directly dependent on Loyalty Fund income and will also be permitted to benefit in accordance with the gifts it receives.

(By so noting on his pledge card, the donor may, if he wishes, give to the University without designating his contribution to a particular school or college. Also, if he wishes to designate it to a school or college other than his own, he may do so by noting this on the pledge card.)

Q. Suppose I want my gift to go to a building fund, or to the athletic scholarship fund.

A. Gifts for special (restricted) purposes are welcomed, certainly, for they are essential to the development of the University. They cannot be credited as Loyalty Fund participation, however, because they cannot be counted toward the Loyalty Fund goal, which is determined totally by the need for operating funds for instructional programs.


