# Nixon trails in '72 Michigan poll

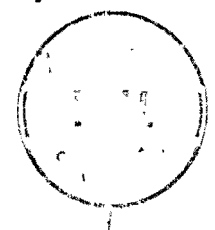
President Richard M. Nixon's lead in the Michigan poll is slipping, according to a new survey by the Detroit Free Press. The poll shows that Nixon is trailing in the state, with a lead of only 12 percent over his closest competitor, George Romney.

The poll, conducted by the Free Press and the Detroit News, shows that 42 percent of Michigan voters favor Nixon, while 30 percent favor Romney. The remaining 28 percent are undecided.

The poll also shows that 65 percent of voters favor a Democratic candidate in the 1972 presidential election, while only 35 percent favor a Republican candidate.

# Nixon trails in '72 Michigan poll

DETROIT (AP)—A new poll shows Richard Nixon trailing in the Michigan presidential election, with Democrat Hubert H. Humphrey leading by a wide margin.

The poll, conducted by the Detroit Free Press, shows Humphrey leading Nixon 54 percent to 38 percent. Senator Frank C. Whitely is in third place with 8 percent.

The poll was taken Sept. 7-10 among 1,000 Michigan voters. It is the first since the 1968 election.

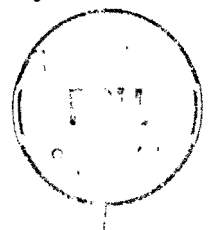
