The Texas rebellion

INCREDIBLY TOUGH in their "throw-'em-out" sweep, Texas voters Saturday justly said that it is time to turn familiar and erstwhile solid old political faces out to pasture and switch to reform.

Rain and tornadic winds didn't deter them one whit. They went out, in high numbers and long lines, to say, first of all, they wanted Dolph Briscoe—a low key campaigner off a South Texas ranch—as the Democratic nominee for governor.

Not Ben Barnes, Texas' 33-year-old political wonder boy whose career had been computer planned, or incumbent Preston Smith. They were mortally wounded at the polls. But only Briscoe, the rancher-banker from John Nance Garner's Uvalde—and Mrs. Frances Farenthold, a Corpus Christi legislator mother of four who excited the state with her slam-bang campaign that got her more votes than any woman since the late Gov. Miriam "Ma" Ferguson.

Briscoe, a wealthy man of the land who said he was just tired of the whole thing, started slowly and his momentum was hard to trace. It came busting in Saturday when the silent undecided went for him like a flock looking for a new shepherd.

But the voters didn't stop with Briscoe. They kicked over the traces to give strong support to William P. Hobby Jr., 40-year-old Houston newspaper

editor and son of a former governor, in his race for lieutenant governor with Treasury Secretary John Connally's brother, Wayne.

They put the same judo blow to Attorney General Crawford Martin, in his battle with reformer John Hill of Houston.

Only Ralph Yarborough, 69-year-old veteran who was bounced out of politics by Lloyd Bentsen in the senatorial race last time out, survived the swirl without critical wounds. But he has to face imbedded Republican Sen. John Tower in the November general election.

Most of the rebellion came from a violent reaction to the Sharpstown stock fraud scandals. Victims fell, whether directly, indirectly or not even remotely connected with the tremor that had previously ruined House Speaker Gus Mutscher.

The climate was right for reform and the voters jumped old political affiliations to vote their wrath.

It spilled right over into the much smaller Republican primary—which was built solely upon reform. Henry Grover of Houston, a legislator, led the GOP ticket in a powerful race for the gubernatorial spot. He will meet Albert Fay, old line party former national committeeman, in a runoff.

It just seemed to be clean-out time in Texas and a lot of high heads hung low as slow returns wrote obituaries Saturday night.

We sincerely hope you will make it possible to honor Ben Ehrlichman in this manner.

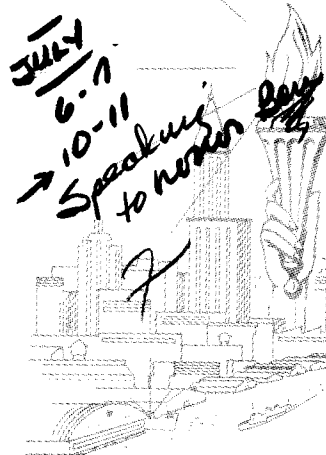
