Dear Rose Mary:


Thanks for everything you have done to help me in the book project. I have problems still, and wrote Herb Klein today about them. They involve the access to people. Mrs. Dorn, for example, is going to check with you or Herb before seeing me. Don Nixon is going to check with the President about opening some of the family material to me.

The problem is not that it causes me delay, because this is not too important, but that you and Herb are going to be nagged to death by people who quite rightly want to be sure they are doing the right thing before talking to me.

I wonder if you could start with that master list, and if someone could write a letter to all those people asking that they see me, and hear my questions, and noting that the President favors this book and that you and Herb have been working with me? It ought to do a lot to prevent your inundation as time goes on. And I would particularly like having such understandings in the works before I make my trip to California this summer to see all the people I have to see.

I hope I am not proving to be too much of a problem to you, but by the nature of the President's position and the manifold demands made on all those around him, they become very cautious (I would too) and this does make things difficult.

While we were away Bernard Brennan died so his information probably will not be available. I turned over the files that I had to A. Ronald Button who is still available but whether he has the files or not I do not know. Also, I turned over a lot of files to the Los Angeles County Central Committee when I went on the bench in 1953. Also, a few years ago I gave a considerable number of files and papers to The Republican Associates. They seemed to be very glad to get them. These papers dealt mainly with (1) the Knowland campaign; (2) the expenses and arrangements at the 1952 election and the following inauguration, i.e., California expenses, assignment of rooms, etc.

**Dear Cruise Member:** This mailing list has been made up to assist you, your family and friends in corresponding during the cruise. However, sudden and unexpected changes in air and steamship schedules are always possible, and as a result we cannot be responsible for errors or changes due to alterations in steamship and airline schedules or other causes. We would, therefore, suggest that you also consult your local Post Office regarding mail connections from your vicinity. Whenever possible, letters should be airmailed well in advance.


**Ship-to-Shore Telephone:** The Hamburg passengers may be contacted by RADIO-TELEPHONE while at sea, through the high seas operator.

**Registered Letters** are liable to take much longer in transit than ordinary letters, and should be posted earlier to allow for this. Furthermore at most places, registered letters cannot be delivered on board and a personal visit to the local Post Office is necessary.

**Parcels:** The sending of parcels cannot be too strongly discouraged, owing to the uncertainty of the time taken in transit. In particular, it is advisable not to send parcels containing dutiable articles, as in many countries the duty is so heavy that it becomes unprofitable to the sender or receiver, and involves a visit to the Custom House.

**Postage:** Please see that the correct POSTAGE is placed on the letters and papers; otherwise they will be delayed.

TS Hamburg is registered in West Germany.
