It is an honor to be roasted by the man who holds the one political job that I wanted and was never able to get (pause). They did give me a consolation prize in November, however. (pause) But, for the longest time I had the impression that Governor Reagan wanted the consolation prize, too. (pause)

In seriousness, I would like to address you for a very few minutes on the objective that I believe that we, as Republicans should set for ourselves, in the coming four years. We go to Washington and find that for the first time in a century, the opposition controls both Houses of the Congress. We look at any sample of public opinion in the nation and we find that in terms of allegiance of the electorate, we are far and away still the minority party in this nation.

One of the objectives of this Administration will be to change that. One of the objectives of this new Administration is to build the New Majority, the successor coalition to the political alliance formed by Franklin Roosevelt which has governed America and held the allegiance of the American electorate for the last of this century.

The final third of this century, we must make the Republican restoration. We hold in our collective hands, in this room, enough of the instruments of government power, to accomplish that objective. We hold the Chief Executive office of the United States and of six of seven of its greatest and most populous states.

We have the White House and the State Houses in New York, California, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Illinois and Michigan, and more than a score of other states. We will not win an opportunity like this again, if we forfeit the one we have today.

It will take co-ordination and co-operation between us, as we have not had in the past. It will take a concerted effort for the Republican Party as a political instrument to win back the allegiance of hundreds of thousands of black Americans who are disillusioned

with our party today. We need to win back the workingmen and working women of America, union and non-union, to the Republican banner. We must inter forever in the history books the myth that the Republican Party is enemy to the common man. We must build in addition to the Republican heartland between the Appalachians and the Rockies, an impregnable Republican fortress of the modern South.

To accomplish this, we must open our party to new men and women, to the young. We must make our party the center forum in which the great foreign and domestic debates of the future are conducted.

To build this historic New Majority in American politics will require far more than effective and efficient party work at the precinct level in every state in America. It will depend how men who bear the Republican label conduct themselves in public office. This is our opportunity; and it is one of the missions to which I have committed myself for the next four years: it is a mission that will not succeed without your help and your assistance, that is what I ask today.

PALM DESERT, CALIF. -- Leading Coachella Valley medical authorities today were briefed on a plan of action adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Eisenhower Medical Center.

On behalf of Board President Mrs. Bob Hope, who is traveling in the East, Vice-president Paul Jenkins presented to representatives of the three area hospitals and the Desert Health Center Foundation the outline of a three-phase development concept for the long-awaited Health facility.

In a prepared statement, Jenkins told the assembly:

"The Board of Trustees is announcing the completion of the first phase of the development of the Eisenhower Medical Center. That phase has consisted of the extensive investigation and study, organization, preliminary fund-raising, and general preparation that precede the establishment of a significant medical institution.

Based on its action on careful and thorough consideration of all of the factors presented to us as a result of the studies and exploration of Phase I, and on the principal recommendations of authoritative medical consultants, the Board of Trustees has unanimously adopted a motion re-affirming its concept of the Eisenhower Medical Center as a national specialized desert medical institute.

The Board has also unanimously authorized an immediate commitment to Phase II of the concept, which consists of building the first 90-bed hospital unit on the Center's 80-acre site in Palm Desert. The eventual 130-bed unit will fulfill the expressed wish of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and will be designed to meet defined needs for health facilities and services.

To augment the Board's commitment to this task, it has appointed Trustees John Curci and Aksel Nielsen to serve with Peter Kiewit, Pollard Simons and Paul Trousdale as Building Committee members.

Feasibility studies indicate that the costs of constructing and equipping the 130-bed hospital unit will be \$7,754,500 -- of which more than \$2,000,000 has been received or committed. We believe a realistic target date for the completion of Phase II is 1971, and that the community hospital portion of the Center will be in operation by that date.

Concurrent with Phase II, the Board of Trustees will commence with determining, through further study and investigation -- conducted by a panel of the most eminent medical scientists -- what shall be the precise and defined nature of the Eisenhower Medical Center beyond the community health

facilities and services.

Our studies indicate there is need for a research and treatment facility of national scope to serve a focal role for progress within certain specialized medical fields. To which specific diseases the Center's laboratories, facilities and staff should devote their efforts will be determined -- by the finest scientific minds Eisenhower Medical Center can muster -- during Phase III.

Affiliation with appropriate organizations and institutions in the health sciences and the Center's potential role as a teaching facility will also be explored.

Eisenhower Medical Center's relationship with neighboring medical organizations and hospitals will be cooperative and supportive.

A letter has been received by Mrs. Hope from Donald McDermott, president of the Desert Hospital Board of Directors, stating that Board's endorsement of the recent report submitted by the Desert Health Center Foundation. The report focuses attention on the urgent importance of area-wide planning and maintenance of good communication between all health and hospital agencies serving the area.

A portion of the letter reads: 'The Board of Directors... hereby offers its resources at governing, medical staff and administrative levels to work with the Eisenhower Medical Center Foundation Board and personnel toward the development of the most appropriate plans for the expansion of valley-wide medical and hospital services and facilities...

'It is our sincere hope that this...will open up a medium for discussion and cooperation that cannot help but fulfill the needs of the residents of the area, both for the immediate future and for the years ahead.'

Mrs. Hope has replied, on behalf of the Board of Trustees, and expressed our sincere appreciation to Deaert Hospital's Directors and our intention to pursue the Foundation's recommendations in the spirit of fullest cooperation."

The Board of Trustees of the Eisenhower Medical Center this month reaffirmed the concept of EMC as a national specialized desert medical institute, and announced the beginning of construction of the Center's first 90-bed hospital unit. Target date for completion is 1971.

The planned 100-bed unit will fulfill the expressed wish of General Eisenhower and meet defined needs for health facilities and services. The unit and other Center facilities will be located on an 30-acre site near Palm Desert, donated by Mr. and Mrs. Bob Hope, and near General Eisenhower's winter residence.

Extensive research and study indicate there is definite need for an institution of national scope to serve a focal role for progress in certain specialized medical fields ... the non-fatal chronic cripples.

Concurrent with the construction of the hospital unit, the Trustees have enlisted the authoritative recommendations of the most eminent men in the scientific and medical research fields. It will be their task to determine toward which specific diseases the Eisenhower Medical Center's staff, research laboratories, treatment and teaching facilities will be committed.




Undoubtedly there will be a press meeting prior to the Cardinal's dinner and another one during Dick's visit with the governors in Palm Springs.

I am enclosing a magazine article written about a house, owned jointly by me and Mr. Martin Woolin. This house is located approximately three miles south from the end of Key Biscayne and I think it will offer you all of the advantages that you seek.

The house contains four bedrooms, a large living room, a bar, a full kitchen, one bath and a large sun deck. There is both electricity and running water. It is completely furnished, comfortable and nicely decorated.

In regard to privacy and security, I think you will find this house meets the requirements in both areas to the maximum. The house can only be reached by boat; it is approximately ten minutes by boat from the Key Biscayne Yacht Club. Because it can be reached only by boat, security becomes a relatively simple matter and privacy is 100% assured. In addition, it places you within 45 minutes by auto and boat of the Miami International Airport, within 10 minutes of Key Biscayne and within a 30 minute boat ride to the Homestead Air Force Base. The house is equipped with both a mobile telephone and a Citizens Band shortwave radio to permit complete communication ability with the mainland.



Police yesterday studied pictures of a daring jewel thief silhouetted in the act of climbing into a Turville Heath, England, country mansion where Mrs. Jacqueline Onassis is staying in England.

The burglar stole gems valued at more than \$12,000 belonging to Mrs. Onassis' sister, Princess Lee Radziwill Friday night.

Photographer Oldrich Karasek was hanging around the edge of the mansion's grounds hoping for a picture of Mrs. Onassis. He unexpectedly saw the burglar.

"The light inside the bedroom was switched on," Karasek recalled. "I got three exposures of the man silhouetted as he was climbing in the window."

Meanwhile, Mrs. Onassis was visited yesterday by famous ballet dancer Rudolf Nureyev.

14 Persons Are Injured By Tornadoes In Alabama

Tornadoes and torrential Chilton county, almost

rain poured the Deep South squarely in the middle of the state, reported the most injuries — about nine. None was serious, though.

The late afternoon tornadoes, spawned by a cold front moving through the South, were confined to Alabama and

mild.
